
Ukraine Crisis Update: May 21, 2015



Russian-backed separatists broadened their offensive operations along the frontline in Donbas ahead of Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko's trip to the EU Eastern Partnership summit in Riga, Latvia. Russia may facilitate expanded separatist offensive operations in retaliation to Ukraine's participation in the partnership initiative, which Moscow views as a hostile encroachment on its sphere of influence. Russia's delivery of a 27th supply convoy to Donetsk and Luhansk, the deployment of advanced Russian-made surface-to-air missile systems east of Mariupol and Ukraine's shooting down of a Russian-made drone north of Donetsk and capture of two reported Russian military personnel near Schastia in Luhansk Oblast signal Russia's continued efforts to bolster separatist fighting capabilities along the front line. Fighting along the M03 highway between the cities of Artemivsk and Debaltseve reached its peak intensity since combined Russian-separatist forces captured Debaltseve on February 18. A sharp escalation of separatist attacks in the neighboring Popasna District of Luhansk Oblast may signal separatist intent to posture for a future Debaltseve-style "cauldron" maneuver to encircle Artemivsk. Such a maneuver would allow the Russian-backed separatists to advance north and threaten the Kyiv-backed Donetsk Oblast government and the Ukrainian Anti-Terrorist Operation (ATO) headquarters in Kramatorsk. Ukraine's ATO press service reported that separatists fired incendiary munitions as part of a "scorched earth" operation against the village of Pisky, west of the destroyed Donetsk airport. This report and continued shelling of civilian areas around Donetsk and elsewhere may point to separatist operations to clear out populated frontline areas prior to launching offensive maneuvers.
